Social Dimensions of Health Institute

Professor Robert Raeside is an applied statistician who currently works in the Employment Research Institute at Edinburgh Napier University. Much of his current research is on the analysis of large data sets to expose factors related to a person's wellbeing. He works with colleagues in health and has collaborated in undertaking field work in to the well being of women in rural Bangladesh. He has been part of interdisciplinary teams researching the importance of social networks in reproductive health, institutional partnering, organisational communications and in the employability of older people.

A person's social network can determine many facets such as their employability, wellbeing and even their likelihood of delinquency. Hence, it is important for public health researchers to understand these networks and to incorporate network variables in to analysis. The methods of social network analysis (SNA) provide a framework to enable interdisciplinary research to be conducted to understand these networks. In this workshop an overview of social networks in public health will be given and approaches to data collection and analysis considered. An introduction to the readily available SNA software will be given using data collected in the workshop and key variables exposed.
